#### **BP 2520 Academic Senate**

#### Reference:

Education Code Section 70902(b)(7); Title 5, Sections 53200 et seq Accreditation Standard IV.A Board Policy 2510 Participation in Local Decision Making

The Academic Senate is organized under the provisions of the California Code of Regulations, Title 5, shall represent the faculty and make recommendations to the administration and to the Board with respect to academic and professional matters, so long as the exercise of such functions does not conflict with the lawful collective bargaining agreement.

The Board or its designee will consult collegially with the Academic Senate when adopting policies and procedures. The Board will rely primarily on faculty expertise on academic and professional matters as defined by Sub-Chapter 2, Section 53200, et seq., California Administrative Code, Title 5, and as listed below:

- 1. Curriculum, including establishing prerequisites and placing courses within disciplines;
- 2. Degree and certificate requirements;
- 3. Grading policies;
- 4. Educational program development;
- 5. Standards and policies regarding student preparation and success;
- 6. District and College governance structures as related to faculty roles;
- 7. Faculty roles and involvement in accreditation process, including self-study and annual reports;
- 8. Policies for faculty professional development activities;
- 9. Processes for program review;
- 10. Processes for institutional planning and budget development, and
- 11. Other academic and professional matters as mutually agreed upon between the Board of Trustees and the Academic Senate.

The Academic Senates' organization, membership functions and committee structure shall be developed by the Academic Senate.

#### IV. REPORTS

**President's Report-** Paul Flor reporting.

- Stated that information was sent to us from the Chancellor's Office about creating pathways and we will be hearing more about this in the future.
- Academic Senate at ECC- Jean Shankweiler reported on guided pathways. The Governor's budget is including money for guided pathways. This is to fund different approaches to help with career placement. We will likely have to look for courses that are better suited for these plans. The purpose is to fast track students to get through college. An overview statewide is that there are too few students graduating. This could be detrimental to the California economy. Students are not graduating and getting out into the workforce as well, students are taking classes that are not necessary and the state could save billions of dollars by reducing the amount of class choices that students have.
- Institutional Effectiveness Committee- The report can be found in the packet. Some of the program reviews have been designated as needing very little revision.
- Homeless Student Taskforce- There is a faculty food drive to stock the food pantry. Gillis
  asked if they are only taking food items- Woodward stated that they are also taking hygiene
  items.

- Score Card- We are on target or have reached our goals with institutional goals. Halligan discussed the Institutional Effectiveness Outcomes and discussed each of the categories individually and the success in each area.
- College Council- ECC is doing very well with their score card and Halligan passed around ECC's information. We will be given more information at the next meeting about the difference between a board policy and procedure.
- Plenary- April 18-20<sup>th</sup>- Halligan attended. One of the things that he noticed is that there are less people involved in Senate. He encouraged people to participate at the state level in committee work. The conversation about ACCJC was continued at Plenary. The conversation was about interpreting your data and making the best use of your data. We need to make sure that we are tapping into the data in all of the ways that we are able to benefit.

- Transfer Center Report- Theresa Barragan-Echeverria spoke. Discussed the services that are offered through the Transfer Center. She would love to come to our classes and speak to students about transferring. UC has simplified their transfer process. Transfer associates degree between 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 have more than doubled which is exciting news. This information can be found in the PowerPoint presentation which will be sent out. Flor stated that there are many successes on campus and we just need to let other people know.
