May 2020 Accomplishments

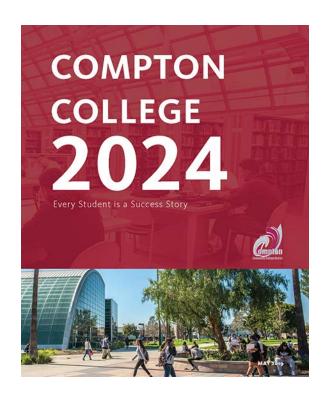
- Compton College Collaborative Governance Document completed.

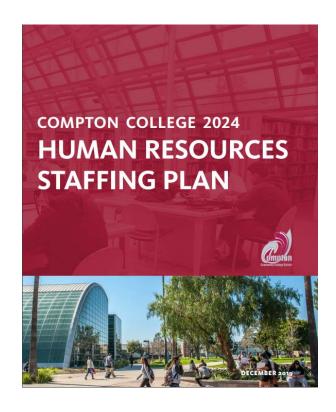

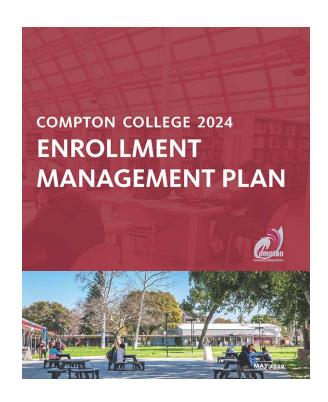

2020-2021 BUDGET



2021 California State Budget

- No Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) in the 2020-2021 Budget.
- 10% Budget Reduction in the amount of \$4.2 million for the 2020-2021 year.
- 55% Budget Reduction to Strong Workforce Local Program in the amount of \$\$257,503. Compton College Budget for the Strong Workforce Local Program was \$468,188 for the 2019-2020 year.
- 12.105% Budget Reduction to Adult Education Program, in the amount of in the \$49,919.81. Compton College Budget was \$412,390 for the 2020-2021 year.
- Compton College Physical Education Complex Replacement was included in the 2020-2021 Budget.



Student-Centered Funding Formula Update

Supplemental	20%

2020-2021 Guiding Principles to the Budget

- Maintain current staffing level and continue with the implementation of the Compton College 2024, 2024 Human Resources Staffing Plan, 2024 Technology Plan, and the 2024 Enrollment Management Plan.
- Student learning and student success is key to every recommendation/decision.
- All efforts will be made to create and support revenue generating opportunities.



2021 California State Budget

2020-2021 Guiding Principles to the Budget

- As we will not be able to offer the same number of programs and class sections, nor the same level of student support services, reductions will be achieved by assessing all programs and services for their viability, relevance, cost effectiveness and ability to meet community needs.
- Remaining programs and student support services will be of high quality and appropriately supported.
- Compton College is a dynamic, flexible organization that will easily adapt as future changes to our State's economy unfold.





ACCREDITATION



Accreditation

- Compton College was granted initial accreditation by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) on June 7, 2017.
- Mid-term report due to ACCJC by March 15, 2020.
- Institutional Self-Evaluation Report due to ACCJC in January 2024 with an Accreditation Visit by an External Evaluation Team scheduled for spring of 2024.
